Sovereign God, you turn your greatness into goodness for all the peoples on earth. Shape us into willing servants of your kingdom, and make us desire always and only your will, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

First Reading: reading from Isaiah 53:4-12.

This reading is from the last of four passages in Isaiah that are often called “servant songs.” Christians are probably most familiar with this servant song. In light of Christian faith, the servant’s healing ministry and redemptive suffering are understood to be fulfilled in the life and death of Christ.

⁴Surely he has borne our infirmities
and carried our diseases;
yet we accounted him stricken,
struck down by God, and afflicted.

⁵But he was wounded for our transgressions,
crushed for our iniquities;
upon him was the punishment that made us whole,
and by his bruises we are healed.

⁶All we like sheep have gone astray;
we have all turned to our own way,
and the LORD has laid on him
the iniquity of us all.

⁷He was oppressed, and he was afflicted,
yet he did not open his mouth;
like a lamb that is led to the slaughter,
and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent,
so he did not open his mouth.

⁸By a perversion of justice he was taken away.

Who could have imagined his future?

For he was cut off from the land of the living,
stricken for the transgression of my people.

Second Reading: A reading from Hebrews 5:1-10.

Using imagery from scripture and from Jewish worship practices, Jesus is presented as the great high priest who was obedient to God's saving plan.

Through his suffering and death he has become the source of eternal salvation.

¹Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. ²He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; ³and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. ⁴And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

⁵So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

“You are my Son,
today I have begotten you”;

⁶as he says also in another place,

“You are a priest forever,
according to the order of Melchizedek.”

⁷In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. ⁸Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; ⁹and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, ¹⁰having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?” ³⁹They replied, “We are able.” Then Jesus said to them, “The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; ⁴⁰but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared.”

⁴¹When the ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. ⁴²So Jesus called them and said to them, “You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. ⁴³But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, ⁴⁴and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. ⁴⁵For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.”







“Backpacks for Pumas” Food Drive



School is well underway and so is the “Backpacks for Pumas” program at Pfaff Elementary, our neighbor on Sleepy Hollow Road. St. John’s donates items for this program which supplies food to students for whom meals are limited on the weekends. Thus far, food for eight families is sent home each Friday. St.

John’s will hold a food drive Oct. 17-24 to provide goods for the program. Items may be dropped off at the church during weekday office hours, Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. or before or after services on Oct. 17 and 24. The drive will culminate Sunday, Oct. 24, with the celebration of St. John’s annual “Harvest Home.” Tables are set up under the cupboards on the side wall of the multi-purpose room to accommodate donations.

Most needed are: cereal (large boxes or individual servings), oatmeal (packets), granola bars/snacks (e.g., goldfish, mini packs of cookies, cheese/peanut butter crackers), pasta, pasta sauce (plastic or cans), rice (packets, Rice a Roni), noodles (packets, Pasta Roni), peanut butter (plastic), jelly (plastic), mac and cheese and instant mashed potatoes (packets). Also needed before the next food drive are canned vegetables, tuna/canned chicken and fruit. We ask that nothing in glass containers or with expired or soon-to-be expired “sell-by” dates be included.

Another food drive will be held in January or February depending on the need. Thank you, in advance, for any goods you can supply. For further information contact Randy or Becky Felten at 215-529-7436.

Worship in the Sanctuary

We had all hoped that the pandemic would be gone by now - but ongoing variations in the disease, combined with lower-than-anticipated vaccination rates in the U.S. and abroad has meant that new strains of the disease are still a factor in our assembly. For this reason the Church Council has endorsed the following guidelines from the Worship and Music Committee. These policies are informed by the CDC, as well as the recommendations of the Synod:

1. We will make use of alternating pews to maintain physical distance between groups during worship.
2. The use of masks is encouraged in our Church for worship. Masks should be worn while singing - with the exception of soloists and duets. Masks will be provided by the Church to those who need them.
3. Balcony seating is only for parishioners who will wear their masks during the whole service as an intentional space for members who feel most safe when masked.
4. Worship leaders - including singers, greeters, lectors, ushers, communion assistants, the pastor, the organist, and the choir director must all be vaccinated OR wear proper masks when actively involved in the service.
5. The service will be shortened to 45 minutes while in the sanctuary.
6. We will be returning to our traditional order of the service (including the passing of the peace in the middle of the service, a return to the Offering, as well as to Bread and Wine for Holy Communion - in the "Continuous Communion" style).
7. We will continue to take attendance for the sake of contact tracing. We encourage all members to contact the Church Office if they contract Covid-19.
